Right to "Good Faith Estimate" Notice Effective: 01/01/2022

Under the "No Surprises Act", healthcare providers will provide patients who do not have health insurance or who are not using insurance an estimate of the bill for medical items and services.

You have the right to receive a "Good Faith Estimate" explaining the total estimated cost of your healthcare services upon request or when scheduling such services. This includes related costs like medical tests, prescription drug screening, equipment, and any related fees.

If you schedule a health care service at least 3 days in advance, you have the right to receive a good faith estimate in writing within 1 business day after scheduling. If you schedule a healthcare service at least 10 days in advance, you have the right to receive your good faith estimate in writing within 3 business days after scheduling. You can also request from any healthcare provider or facility a good faith estimate before you schedule your visit or procedure. If you do, make sure you receive your good faith estimate in writing within 3 days of your request.

If you receive a bill that is at least \$400 more than your good faith estimate, you can dispute that bill.

Be sure to save a copy or picture of your good faith estimate and the bill.
